In support of National Distracted distracted driving laws. the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA):

 3,477 people were killed and an vehicle crashes involving distracted drivers in 2015. That is a 9-percent increase in fatalities as compared to the previous year.

•10 percent of fatal crashes, 15 percent of injury crashes and 14 per-

cent of all police reported motor vehicle crashes in 2015 were reported as distraction affected crashes.

·Just as disturbing, even as faestimated 391,000 injured in motor talities go up, fewer drivers seem concerned about texting while driving. According to foundation's 2015 Traffic Safety Culture Index, significantly fewer motorists (77 percent) believed texting while driving is a problem, down from 96 percent in 2013, a 19-point drop in just two
